

Thanks also go out to our affiliate friends who helped sponsor dinner, carts and golf holes.





and placing pins. Play usually ended around 4 p.m. at Oak Ridge and an hour later at Interlachen at which times preparations for the following day would begin.

Perhaps more tedious at Interlachen was the clean-up work after the tournament was completed. With some 10,000 fans following the action, there was garbage to be removed, aerating, seeding, sodding plus other duties to get the course prepared for member play.

This wasn't as difficult at Oak Ridge where smaller galleries followed the 24 junior players.

Interlachen first learned it would bw the 2002 site in 1996, and Oak Ridge was advised in 2000 that it would be the location for the juniors. Both superintendents were pleased to get the news.

"I was extremely excited," said Rostal, who also had good reason to be

pleased with the variety compliments paid by players and tournament official. Many said it was one of the best overall venues they had ever visited.

And such was the case with Scott, who said "it was a great honor to host this inaugural junior tournament." He also enjoyed "spending time with the Solheim family, the Ping Company, the American Junior Golf Association officials and viewing the golf matches."

For the record the American team recaptured the Solheim Cup 15.5 to 12.5 while the American juniors prevailed 17-7

in this opening tournament.

Both U.S. Captain Patty Sheehan and European Captain

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Tips for Good PC Maintenance

Know your system. At a minimum, you should know what kind of processor you have, how much random access memory (RAM) is installed and how big your hard drive is. If you're aware of these vital statistics, you'll be in a better position to troubleshoot problems when programs tap your machine's capabilities.

Make an Emergency Boot Disk

Before you have problems with your computer, create a startup disk using your original operating system's CD. Save this disk in a safe place for the day – which you hope will never come – when your computer has problems boot-

ing up from the hard drive. If you're using Windows, you should also create a separate floppy disk with the config.sys file, which is the driver that enables your computer to read the system disk from the CD drive.

Use Your System's Built-In Utilities

Your hard drive stores information by scattering it on the hard drive and eventually this fragmentation slows dow the computer. Run Disk Defragmenter to consolidate the data and keep your drive organized.

Use Antivirus Software

Install an antivirus program, and set it to scan your system automatically at least twice a month.

Back Up Regularly

Make a habit of backing up all your important files at least once a month.

Attending to these housekeeping duties should keep your machine happy and your data safe.

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European Junior Solheim Captain Lauds Oak Ridge

It Was a Treat for Our Players, Many of Whom Had Not Played On Greens This Smooth and Fast'

Chances are you still remember when you first played golf on a truly outstanding course that offered comfortable tee boxes, trim fairways and firm, fast greens.

Chances are the 24 young golfers who participated in the Ping Junior Solheim Cup at Oak Ridge Country Club also took home fond memories.

This September competition drew rave reviews from players, spectators, sponsors and tournament staff, but perhaps the most touching remarks came from European Captain Marta Figuera-Dotti: "Many of our players had

never putted on greens this smooth and fast. Oak Ridge was an outstanding treat for our players."

Tournament officials said that Oak Ridge Superintendent Keith Scott and his crew "prepared perfect tournament conditions for an event of his magnitude. The fairways were cut and groomed so well that you almost felt guilty taking a divot."

They also said the greens were "firm and fast, holding the well-struck ball but deflecting any mis-hits players threw their way."

The girls played the course at 6,147 yards using a combination of members' tees. It played to a par 70.

Solheim Cup Was Created in 1990 By Karsten and Louise Solheim

In 1990 Karsten and Louise Solheim's goal of creating an international competition for women was realized with the inaugural match of The Solheim Cup.

Played biennially, the Solheim features the top Europeanborn players from the Ladies European Tour (LET) and the top U.S.-born players from the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LOPGA) competing in a format similar to the Ryder Cup.

Now the premier event in women's golf, players on both sides of the Atlantic compete for points in their respective Tour events to earn a spot on the team.

In 2000 at Loch Lomond the European team won by the close score of $14 \frac{1}{2}$ to $11 \frac{1}{2}$.

After winning at Interlachen in September, the U.S. now leads the series five matches to two.
