THE LAKESIDE MEETING

The June meeting of the Mid-Atlantic Association of Golf Course Superintendents was held at the Lakeside Country Club, Richmond, Virginia. Despite a steady down-pour with no promise of relief, fifty-three members of the Association braved the storm to pay tribute to one of its most loyal members - Harry Allanson. Harry travels 100 miles or more to attend the Mid-Atlantic Meetings each month in the D. C.-Baltimore area, so it was fitting and proper that he in turn should have a nice turn-out at his course. It was a wonderful and deserving gesture for a wonderful and deserving guy. The excellent attendance in part was due to the wonderful attendance of the superintendents in the Richmond area. We hope this sets a precedent and that they will continue to attend our monthly meetings.

Golf

Most of the golf for the day was confined to the 19th hole, and everybody shot par. Before the afternoon was over, Golf Committee Chairman, Ernie Stanley, deducted 5 strokes from everybody's handicap. Only three members played the other 18 holes for which they deserve a medal and an appointment with a psychiatrist. The Major and Reuben eyed each other suspiciously, made threatening gestures, but neither braved the storm.

Business Meeting

Because of the inclement weather the business meeting preceded the dinner. Prexy Bob Shields called the meeting to order early, introduced several guests and the hosts for the day, Harry Allanson; Allan Brodie, Professional; and Israel November, Green Committee Chairman of the Lakeside Club. Mr. November welcomed and congratulated the group for its splendid attendance. His welcome speech was a propriate and timely as his central theme was the importance of the exchange of ideas. He cited a few examples in business where competitors were careful to guard any so-called trade

secrets only to find that these secrets were really no secrets at all. The letter met with whole-hearted approval of the group and superlatives were batted around freely with regard to the value of such constructive suggestions for each course that the Association visits. Admiral Phillips suggested that the constructive suggestion letter be sent to all persons on the Turf News Letter mailing list. All present concurred.

Discussion then revolved about the time, effort, and cost of these publications. How and by whom could the cost best be absorbed? After much discussion, it was agreed that a grant of \$100 would be made to the USGA Green Section to facilitate publication of the Turf News Letter and the Constructive Suggestion Feature. It was understood further that this money would be used on the turf plots at Beltsville. Also the Education Committee will draw up a perspectus that will bring in additional funds from the golf clubs in this area. The greater portion of such funds will be channeled to the Green Section to facilitate publication of these papers and to cover costs of additional experimental plantings on our golf courses.

Publicity

Jim Reynolds and John Anderson arranged for newsman Lawrence Leonard of The Richmond Times Dispatch to interview Bill Glover, Reuben Hines and Charlie Shalestock. The boys gave Leonard a liberal education in turf, and the article will be of general interest to homeowners rather than golf course superintendents. Leonard also was responsible for the article and photograph which appeared in the Richmond Post Dispatch.

New Members

Tommy Card, Pro-superintendent of Keswick Country Club, Keswick, Virginia, was voted into the organization as an active member.

Armed Service Personnel

Many of our Mid-Atlantic members are in the Armed Services. Others will be called to active duty, and of course, transfers will take place from time to time. Sgt. Jim Broadus and Al. Thomas, Jr., are two such members who would like to continue their membership even though temporarily away from this area. As a small token of our appreciation for their present duties, it was unanimously agreed that active membership with suspension of dues during the present emergency should be extended to these men and any others who are called away to active duty in other parts of the world. We wish them the best of luck, and hope that the Turf News Letter will keep them abreast of developments in the Mid-Atlantic area.
