in that his golf courses have always been good; he is a gardener and landscape man who is familiar with growing trees, shrubs and flowers as well as grass; he is a golf architect and earned his living as a builder for years before becoming superintendent at Baltimore Country Club where one of his first jobs was to supervise construction of the Club's second course - the Five Forms layout. He has had a hand (and foot) in the building of more golf courses in the Baltimore area than any other one man. If the courses was built or re-built in the last 34 years, Bob Scott was called in for advice and consultation which he gladly gave gratis in most cases because of his sincere desire to see the game expanded and brought within reach of more players.
