IN THE MAIL

Dear Mr. Shields:

An article in the August 1957 issue of "MID-ATLANTIC TURF LETTER" published by the USGA was brought to my attention. It suggested the use of flour or cheap syrup instead of kerosene as the vehicle for lapping in mowers.

For the past two years I have suggested to the golf course superintendents in the Mid-Atlantic area that they try adding the liquid ball cleaner they use in their golf ball washers as the carrier for their lapping compound. Those who have tried it are very enthusiastic about this method. The liquid cleaner has several advantages. It holds the emery compound in suspension and can be easily rinsed off and thoroughly cleaned by a simple hosing. It is non-toxic, non-inflammable, non-corrosive and is readily available since most golf courses have it in stock for their ball washers.

If you could bring this to the attention of the Directors of the " EAST-EN TURF LETTER", possibly the golf course superintendent outside the Mid-Atlantic area might like the idea. It really works.
