Piney Branch is situated in the rolling farmland of Baltimore and Carroll counties, consuming 206 acres. Designed by Eddie Ault, the contractors were Robert Vincent Co., and Del Val Co. The course was opened for 9 hole play in 1965 and 18 holes in 1971. The course measures 6,508 from white tees and 6,850 from blues. he grasses are as follows:

Greens - Penncross and Poa, 7 to 8,000 sq. feet., cut 3/16'' to 1/4'' five times a week depending on outings, and receive 5 lbs. of N/yr.

Tees - Original seeding Meriod and Pennlawn, over-seeded to just about everything, New Blues and Rye, cut 3/4'' 3 times a week, and receive 4 lbs. of N/yr.

Fairways - Original seeding Kentucky Blue and Red Fescue, overseeded to New Blues and Rye, cut 1 1/4'', set on firm base, 3 times a week, and receive 2 lbs. of N/yr. *Roughs* - Tough set of k-31.

Take Reisterstown Road (U.S. Route 140, 695 Beltway Exit 20) to Reisterstown. Then take the Hanover Road (Md. Route 30) for about eight miles to Trenton Mill Road. Turn right and drive about 1/2 mile to Piney Branch entrance.
