The Mid Atlantic Association of Golf Course Superintendents elected the Officers and Board of Directors that will take the association into the next century on Tuesday, December 14, 1999. The annual membership meeting was held at The Suburban Club in Baltimore, MD and hosted by John Kotoski, CGCS.

The MAAGCS membership first voted in a bylaw change that eliminates the Class G membership. This change was needed to bring the MAAGCS membership classifications in compliance with the GCSAA Affiliated Chapter Dual Membership Agreement. Following the bylaw vote, Past President Mike Gilmore, presented the slate of candidates for officers. Mr. Nick Vance, CGCS from Rattlewood Golf Course was elected President, Mr. Chris Ayers, CGCS from Lakewood Country Club was elected Vice-President, Mr. Mike Evans, Golf Course Superintendent at The Country Club of Woodmore, was elected to a second term as Secretary and Mr. Tim Norris, CGCS from Army Navy Country Club in Fairfax was elected to the position of Treasurer. The new members of the Mid Atlantic Association of Golf Course Superintendents Board of Directors are Mr. Dean Graves, Golf Course Superintendent at Bethesda Country Club, Mr. Ken Ingram, CGCS, Golf Course Superintendent at Bretton Woods Recreation Center, and Mr. Dave Nehila, Golf Course Superintendent at Hunt Valley Golf Club. These gentlemen were elected from a slate of seven strong candidates.

Earlier in the evening outgoing Education Chairman, Ryland Chapman, IV, presented MAAGCS scholarships to four deserving students. Jason Bowers and Steve Evans were both awarded a Merit Scholarship. Brian Moreau and Jeff Van Fleet were also presented MAAGCS scholarships.

Mr. John Kotoski, CGCS, who served as Golf Chairman in 1999, presented the "Player of the Year" award to Mr. Mike Evans, Golf Course Superintendent at The Country Club of Woodmore.

President Walter Montross, CGCS presented Mr. Ryland Chapman, IV, from Fairway Hills Golf Club, with a plaque and thanked him for his service on the Board of Directors over the past three years. Mr. Chapman will be stepping down from the Board this year. Mr. Montross also thanked Mr. Mike Gilmore, Immediate Past President, for the leadership and direction he has provided during his seven years on the MAAGCS Board of Directors.

After the election, Mr. Montross turned the gavel over to newly elected President Vance. President Vance presented Past President Montross with a plaque and gavel as appreciation for his tenure as President. Mr. Vance then thanked the membership for their attendance and wished everyone safe travels home.

Bullets from the Boardroom

MAAGCS Secretary - Mike Evans

The Board of Directors has approved the formation of a fundraising golf tournament with proceeds to be earmarked strictly for government relations issues and research projects. This will be a separate event, and will not coincide with our monthly meeting schedule. The inaugural tournament will be held August 21, 2000 at South River Golf Links. Teams will be comprised of a golf course superintendent, two club officials, and one guest who may be a MAAGCS affiliate member, politician, or university representative. Look for more details this spring.

A motion to raise dues for the year 2000 was unanimously approved by the Board. Dues for Class A, B and F members are \$140 per year, an increase of \$20. Dues for Class C members were raised \$10, to \$105 per year. Non-resident member dues will be \$70. This dues increase, the first in seven years, will help to offset the cost of ever-increasing member services.

A letter was sent on behalf of the MAAGCS to Bud Key, publisher of Chesapeake Golfer, expressing our extreme displeasure with the portrayal of golf course superintendents in an article that appeared in the October issue. When Mr. Key did not respond to the letter, be was contacted by telephone. He stated that the piece was meant to be humorous, with no malice intended, and that he would not offer a formal apology. Mr. Key did, however, extend an invitation to the MAAGCS to write monthly articles for the magazine. The first issue for the year 2000 will be published in March. If you would like to write an article for publication please contact the MAAGCS office.

In response to a suggestion that the MAAGCS, as an Association, endorse certain political candidates for election, the Board of Directors unanimously agreed that such endorsement would not be feasible. To do so would jeopardize our status as a non- profit organization.


The Board unanimously approved a motion to donate \$100 to the Joe Duich Foundation. For decades, Dr. Duich has been instrumental in advancing turfgrass research to benefit golf course superintendents.

The hospitality suite in Timonium will be Tuesday, January 4, at the Holiday Inn from 6:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. The hospitality suite in New Orleans will be Thursday, February 17, at the Radisson Hotel from 8:00 p.m. to ll:00 p.m. Invitations will be mailed in January for the GCSAA reception.

The Eastern Shore Association of Golf Course Superintendents will be partnering with the MAAGCS to host the hospitality suite in New Orleans. We would like to express a hearty 'Thank You" to all of our friends in the ESAGCS for your support.

Beginning with the first MAAGCS golf event in April, all golf participants must have a registered handicap card. A registered handicap card will be required for every MAAGCS-sponsored golf event. Please review the golf policy for the year 2000 in order to avoid a conflict before it arises.

The Board has recently become aware that many members are not wearing their name badges at the monthly meetings. It is nice to be able to attach a name to all the new faces in the Association. Conversely, wearing your name badge makes you readily identifiable to those who are not regular attendees. If you need a name badge please contact the MAAGCS office.

Almost, everyone loves to be patted on the back by others. It feels good. However, when it's not happening, don't let it get you down or adversely affect your



attitude. Praise from others is never a certainty, and making it a condition of your happiness is really a bad idea. What you can do is praise yourself and pat yourself on the back. Be honest and genuine regarding your compliments. If you're doing a good job, say so. If you're working long hours, give yourself credit. If you're making life a little better for even one person, or making any type of contribution to society, then the world is a better place because of you. You deserve to be recognized. It you'll actually take the time to do so, I think you'll find this exercise is well worth the effort.
