


Turfgrass Matters SUMMER 2021

Managing Equipment through the Summer

We're officially at the halfway point in the year until our next joyous four-month window to perform Winter equipment rebuilds. It is important to keep all golf maintenance operations going and equipment ready for use to preserve the turf's health. For instance, if we pass on sharpening a set of reels, grass will be torn or shredded instead of cut. If every rough mower isn't available operators may need to cut later into the day to keep up, which isn't ideal in the summer sun. When we don't have a spare nozzle or filter 0-ring, a spray may not get finished on time. I'm simply saying that our position and responsibilities directly affect the golf course and the maintenance team's ability to do their job properly.

Late July is also a good time to decide which aeration tine best suits the playing surfaces. Our vendors usually have sales/promotions in August and recovery/alleviation in compaction seems to go hand in hand. We like to allocate funds for replacement bedknives as well to follow up with grinding until sand is no longer collected. Another thing in August to look forward to is the BMW Championship that our friends at Caves Valley are hosting. I have the privilege of volunteering in the maintenance shop under Jim Soullier and will share my experiences in the next article.

Thanks to the state of Maryland for their progress in vaccinations- the MAAGCS is now happy to announce an in-person Equipment Manager event on September 15th at Chevy Chase Club. Mark Luffy, an independent consultant, will be discussing all facets of reel cutting units including configuration of future capital purchases based on the variety of grass and height of cut range. Rolling Road Bunker Renovation

Rolling Road Golf Club is undergoing an extensive bunker renovation, bringing the course back to the original design concepts put in place by designer and two-time British Open Winner Willie Park Jr. Superintendent and MAAGCS President Chris Fernandes is documenting the project

through these photos giving us an inside look at their process. Aspects of the renovation include total reconstruction and relocation of all 66 bunkers. The new flat bottom bunkers will feature Better Bill Bunker liner and steep grass faces adding great character to the course. Designer Joel Weiman is capturing the uniqueness of a 100 year old Willie Park Jr. and the McDonald and Son's crew are constructing the bunkers as if they were always here.





U.S. Girls' Junior Contested at Columbia Country Club

One hundred years after it hosted the 1921 U.S. Open Championship, Columbia Country Club, one of Maryland's oldest golf clubs, was the site of the 73rd U.S. Girls' Junior Championship. This is the 15th venue to host both the U.S. Girls and Junior and U.S. Junior Amateur Championships. This is the third USGA Championship to be hosted at Columbia Country Club. Not to mention, the 2015 Stewards of the Chesapeake was also contested at Columbia CC.

First conducted in 1949, the U.S. Girls' Junior Championship is open to female amateurs who have not turned 19 on or before the final day of the championship and have a Handicap Index® not exceeding 9.4. Notable champions include three-time winner Hollis Stacy, Mickey Wright, Nancy Lopez, Amy Alcott, JoAnne Gunderson Carner, Pat Hurst, I.K. Kim, Inbee Park, Lexi Thompson and 2018 U.S. Women's Open champion Ariya Jutanugarn.

Starting in 2017, Girls' Junior champions earn an exemption into the following year's U.S. Women's Open Championship and now the Augusta National Women's Amateur.

The event took place July 12-17. Two rounds of stroke play determined the top 64 players that advanced to match play. Rose Zhang was the medalist in the stroke play and went on to defeat Bailey Davis in the match play finals.

Columbia Country Club is known for its rich history and pristine conditions. Some even say the 16th hole was Bobby Jones' inspiration for #12 at Augusta National. Whether that is true or not, one thing stands firm, the maintenance team led by Superintendent Steve McCormick did a phenomenal job preparing the course and should be proud of showcasing their hard work to millions of viewers that watched the championship on The Golf Channel.
