This is the month to take inventory, machinery, tools, flag poles, flags, and numerous other necessities, checking as you proceed any replacements, repairs, and depreciation on your stock.

Keep your eyes open for anything new in golf course equipment advertised in golf magazines. If you see anything which you feel would be a good investment for your club, talk it over with your chairman. The merits of the particular equipment can be discussed, then when the golf course equipment shows open attend them with your chairman if possible where a personal inspection can be made and your order placed for spring delivery.

Proceed with the overhauling of equipment. Take every machine apart and clean thoroughly. Replace any worn parts. It is wise to overhaul everything before commencing painting, in other words, complete one job before starting another.

Trees which you intend to move can be prepared for moving, digging around them, cutting all of the roots excepting the tap root. Fill the hole around the ball with hay or straw and wait for a cold snap, then remove the straw and let the ball freeze solid. In this way a tree can be moved on the frozen ground and planted with little effort. The hole where the tree is to be planted should be dug before the frost has penetrated more than an inch so the digging is easy, then the hole should be filled with straw until you are ready to put the tree in its place.

Keep a hundred pounds of scratch feed in the barn for our friends the birds who have a hard time finding anything to eat when the snow is on the ground. Feed them on such occasions.
