

The results of your votes in the election of STMA's 1999 officers and board of directors were announced on January 16th, 1999, at the annual meeting held in conjunction with the 10th Annual Conference and Exhibition in Mesa, Arizona.

Reelected to a second term in the office of President was Stephen Guise, Marina Landscape, Inc., Anaheim, CA. Other officers also reelected to a second term include: President Elect - Rich Moffitt, Saint Louis University, St. Louis, MO; Vice President (Commercial) - Bob Curry, Covermaster, Rexdale, ON (Canada): Secretary - L. Murray Cook, Ballpark Services, LLC, Bowie, MD; and Treasurer - Bob Patt, Civic Center/Stadium Manager, City of Canton, Ohio.

Tom Burns, Texas Ranger, Arlington, TX, was reelected to the Category I Board position, representing the Professional Facility Sports Turf Manager.

Elected to the Board for the first time is Dr. Tony Koski, Colorado State University, representing Category III: other Schools, Research, Extension Agents and Teaching. He replaces Mary Owen, Extension Turf Specialist, University of Massachusetts, who had completed two consecutive terms in that position.

Your Board Meeting Report I

our Board of Directors met on January 12th, 1999, at moving toward affiliation were discussed. the Sheraton Mesa Hotel in Mesa, Arizona, in conjunction with the 10th Annual Conference. Following are key details of the meeting.

The minutes of the previous meeting, held on October 23rd and 24th in St. Louis, Missouri, were unanimously approved.

The Board reviewed preliminary end-of-the-year financial information as submitted jointly by Treasurer, Bob Patt, and Executive Director, Steve Trusty. These reports and the check disbursement details from October through December were unanimously approved.



Your Annual Meeting Report

resident Steve Guise called the Annual Meeting of the Sports Turf Managers Association to order at 12:25 PM on January 16, 1999, in Mesa, Arizona. Key details of that meeting follow.

Board Member and Membership Chair, Bob Campbell, reported that 1998 membership on October 1, 1998 (when membership for 1999 officially opened) was 1254 as compared with 975 at the same point in 1997. Combined 1998 and 1999 membership at the end of December was reaching 1500. An information outreach to key non-member extension personnel in all states has produced positive response.

Treasurer Bob Patt reported on STMA's financial status. He noted these figures are unaudited at this time but will be certified in the near future by an independent auditing firm. STMA ended 1998 with an \$88,000 surplus of income over expenses. That's \$63,000 higher than the projections at the beginning of the year. This surplus is based on a total income of \$458,000 and total expenses of \$370,000. Annual dues collections were \$16,000 higher than the initial budgeted projections. STMA's cash in the bank increased by \$118,000, for a total at year's end of \$332,000. Note -the majority of the Conference expenses have yet to be paid. STMA's total equity increased by \$93,376, giving STMA an equity balance of \$147,931 at the end of 1998.

Patt noted, "The credit of course goes to you, the members who support this organization by paying dues, attending this conference, supporting your chapters and going back to your different parts of the country and spreading the word to your peers about what STMA has to offer. Special thanks go to our commercial members who have lent their financial support to the wide range of services and programs that STMA provides."

Board Member and Awards and Scholarship Chair Tim Moore reported on the record number of applicants for scholarships and entries for the Field of the Year Awards, thanked The Toro Company for establishing the Dr. James Watson Scholarships, and congratulated scholarship and award recipients.

Trusty reported the Chapter Officers Training and Exchange Session was a great success. He thanked the 1998 and 1999 Chapter Sponsors. The four newly affiliated Chapters were announced and presented with their gavels. (See page 8.)

Past President and Nominations Chair, Mike Schiller, presented the results of the 1999 election. (See page 5.)

President-Elect Rich Moffitt invited everyone to "Meet me in St. Louis" for the 2000 Conference, January 12 - 16, 2000 at the Regal Riverfront Hotel.

Bob Tracinski, Secretary of the Evergreen Foundation, reported on this green industry outreach to help foster a national greenway system.

The Board also meet briefly at 4:30 PM on January 16th for a post-Conference debriefing and idea exchange session.

The next Board meeting will be held March 12 -13, 1999, in San Diego, CA.

The first ever STMA Chapter Officers Training and Exchange Session took place on January 12th, with representatives of the majority of affiliated and forming chapters joining in the action. If you're a Chapter leader and missed out on it, please contact Headquarters for information.



We truly had a great time in Mesa. It is fun to work with individuals who enjoy themselves and are willing to share so much.



Sports Field Construction: What Do You Do When The Contractor Leaves

ew construction, whether it is a new facility or a field renovation, is an exciting and challenging time in your professional career. It allows you, as a sports turf manager, to truly display your passion for your profession by exercising your expertise and knowledge in a new, positive application. In the general scheme of things, you could labor for years in whatever situation that you hold with little change in your daily routine. New construction usually does not come along very often in your tenure, but it can and should ignite a new excitement within your career. This is a positive experience

to encounter, so when the opportunity presents itself, it is very important to be organized and prepared.


In order to manage your project when the contractor is finished, you need to first be involved in every phase of the planning portion of the project. This guarantees that you will understand just what you possess in your new field/facility. Now is the time to exercise the beliefs and opinions that you have formulated from your experiences as a sports turf manager. Don't be hesitant in asking questions about specific areas of concern.


Regardless of the reputation

of your construction team, never allow the contractor to "hold all the cards." It is of the utmost importance for you to be involved in the design areas of the construction calendar, grading and drainage, irrigation and turfgrass issues. You are now experiencing the first phase of quality control.

Once the contractor is finished, you have two main responsibilities to manage. The first is to document problems and enforce warranty issues. To be in a position of enforcement of warranty issues, a proper contract needs to be drawn up by the appropriate parties. You, as the owner or customer, have the upper hand in the requirements of contract provisions. This can only occur when the owner authors a precise, "tight" contract. It is also the responsibility of the owner to hire reputable consultants, architects and contractors.

It is also the responsibility of the sports turf manager to take the existing construction project and get it "game-day ready." You should be capable of modifying the new field in your own professional style using your available resources. Exercise your aeration, topdressing, mowing and fertility practices that enable you to modify the soil, increase the density of your turf and toughen the performance of the field for your specific athletic demands.

advisor to many sports turf managers across the nation and is an active, contributing member of S T M A's Certification Committee. Through his indi-


vidual activities, his


demonstrated leadership, and his continuing contributions, Ross Kurcab is positively impacting the sports turf industry.


