Featured Conference Speakers STMA 15th Annual Conference, San Diego, CA - January 21-25, 2004

Paul Caligiuri

Long considered one of the most successful and recognizable soccer players in the United States, Paul Caligiuri is in his second year as the head coach of Cal Poly Pomona's men's and women's soccer teams. After earning honors for his collegiate play for UCLA,



Caligiuri played professionally and internationally for 18 years before joining Cal Poly Pomona. From 1984-97, Caligiuri was a member of the US national team and had 110 game appearances, including participation in World Cups in 1990 and 1994 and the 1988 Olympic Games. One of the most memorable moments of his playing career came in 1990 when he scored the gamewinning goal - known as the "Goal Heard Round The World" - that qualified the US for its first World Cup in 40 years. He played professionally on European teams from 1990 to 1995. In 1996, Caligiuri played for the Columbus Crew of the newly-founded Major Soccer League. In 1997, he joined the Galaxy, where he helped the team become one of the league's top defensive units. During the past few years, Caligiuri has been involved with consulting in coaching, planning and organizing camps and clinics throughout the United States. He is also an accomplished broadcaster, working as an expert commentator for ESPN 2's "World Cup 2Night" during the 2002 World Cup. He'll share his insights in his presentation "Soccer -The Player, The Coach and The Field."

Keith Kent

After starting his career as a trainee groundsman at Leicester City Football Club, Keith Kent moved on to the world famous Old Trafford, home of Manchester Union and was in charge of that facility for 15 years. He is now Head Groundsman for the home of English rugby, Twickenham Stadium. He considers the opportunity to work with both nature and the world's top

sportsmen a challenge and great fun. Kent keeps experiments ongoing at Twickenham as sports never stand still and he intends to always be on the leading edge of advancements. In his fifteen years at Old Trafford, he saw the stadium change beyond all comprehension to a 68,000 seat, three tiered stadium, with roofs that cut out light and air movement and created a unique micro-climate. Having moved to

London and the already imposing Twickenham Stadium, and with the proposed development of the South stand, Kent's focus on tackling shade issues will intensify.

Brian Robinson

Brian Robinson, of Green Science, has been on the cutting edge of new technology throughout his career. His involvement in numerous projects throughout the UK will provide an excellent overview of the new technology being adopted by UK sports turf managers in the construction and maintenance of sports



turf surfaces. He'll also provide insight on the influence of the UK weather on playing surface preparation and grass sward development, along with tips on how environmental data and special maintenance techniques incorporated into the specifications can benefit a construction project.

Optimizing Cultural Practices to Improve Athletic Field Performance

urfgrass researchers have long extolled the benefits of proper mowing and fertilization practices to maintain vigorous and healthy turfgrass surfaces. Proper cultural practices (mowing, fertilization, irrigation and cultivation) allow turfgrass stands to compete with weeds, tolerate insect feeding, and better recuperate from disease, drought and traffic. As participation in recreational and interscholastic sports continues to increase and the limited numbers of already well-used and tired fields become overused, unplayable and even unsafe, enhancing the recuperative potential becomes even more important to field performance.

Until recently, however, the effect of cultural practices on the performance of a turfgrass stand had not been studied in a way that made possible a cost-benefit analysis. It is often said that increased mowing frequency and judicious fertility will "improve" a field or make it "better." But it would be difficult for school administrators or municipal officials to justify allocating funds to make the soccer and football field "better" without knowing what "better" is. Researchers at MSU have measured critical field performance characteristics (density and recovery) as affected by various cultural practices and combinations on a per field basis. Knowing the return on investment should allow school administrators and municipal officials to make informed decisions about the maintenance of their athletic fields.

Seven Savvy Suggestions for Super Sports Surfaces

- Mow at least twice per week throughout the growing season.
 - · Maintain cutting height between 1.5 and 2.5 inches.
- Fertilize frequently (seven to 10 applications) throughout the season. Apply no more than 0.5 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet per application. Rate should be reduced or eliminated during hot and dry periods unless irrigation is available.
- · Reduce overall fertilization on heavy soils by 20 to 40 percent.
 - · Cultivate (aerify) twice per year (spring and fall).
 - · Implement an adequate irrigation system.
 - Maintain general turf health to limit weed pressure and increase disease and insect tolerance.

Studies conducted by MSU examined the basic cultural practices of mowing frequency (one or two times per week), fertilization program (medium/infrequent, medium/frequent, high/frequent) and core cultivation (never or

two times per year). Two traffic simulators were used to impose realistic wear on the plots during the fall of each season. The Brinkman Traffic Simulator (BTS) was used to simulate the typical wear of a soccer game, and the Cady Traffic Simulator (CTS) was used to impose typical wear between the hash marks and between the 20-yard lines of a football field, where previous estimates say that 80 percent of a football game takes place. Traffic was applied to half of each plot between the last week of August and mid-November, simulating a total of 25 games.

The major objectives of this research were to determine the most effective maintenance practices for increasing field performance, quantify increased field performance (expressed in number of games) and estimate the costs associated with maintenance practices. The estimated costs for each treatment are given in the charts. It is our hope that this information will be useful to school administrators budgeting for athletic field maintenance and scheduling field usage.

DOC'S DUGOUT - An Inning From Our Past

Dr. Henry Indyk -"True Friend, Colleague & STMA Legend"

Early Days with Henry

I am one of those fortunate people who have had the privilege of knowing and working with Henry for the past 30 years. Hank, as he is known by his many friends, is persistent in pursuing a goal, hard working, friendly, extremely intelligent, especially when it comes to turfgrass problems and solutions, very generous with his energy and time and a man of very high integrity.

Henry served our country in World War II in both Europe and the Pacific with a field artillery unit. He spent several years getting his education, first at Rutgers University where he received his BS in Plant Science &

Henry is a frequent and sought after speaker at many STMA events.

Soils, then on to Penn State University where he earned his MS & PhD in Agronomy & Soils. His first position at the was University of Delaware (1954-1959) as a Research Agronomist, then on to Rutgers where he excelled as Extension Specialist in turfgrass

management (1959-1990). Until 1990 he served the State of New Jersey well in the area of turfgrass management - setting up turfgrass demonstration studies, teaching short courses and providing advice to sports turf facilities and golf courses. Also during this time he was a frequent speaker at turf conferences, seminars and industry groups.

Henry - His Days with Turfgrass Extension and other Ventures

Henry spent 31 years as the Extension Specialist in turfgrass management at Rutgers University. During his tenure he was extremely active putting out many demonstration plots related to various types of weed control and turfgrass fertilizers. All of his turfgrass work resulted in many associations and organizations extending him invitations to speak at their conferences and meetings. I remember when both Henry and I were on the program in Orlando, Florida in the mid 1970's for Erick Madisen who sponsored the National Institute for Grounds Management. Between the two of us we presented 8 different 30-45 minute talks on various aspects of turf and sports turf. Usually these meetings ran for 3 days and we were expected to pay for our airline tickets, most of our meals and at least one nights lodging. We became known as the free speakers. This was the group that supported the early STMA leaders and allowed the infant STMA to hold its first meetings. This was also the

group that STMA left when it became an independent organization in 1984. Those distinguished early-STMA leaders were Dr. Indyk, Dr. Daniel, Dr. Kurtz, Mike Schiller, Dale Sandin, Don Marshall, Harry Gill, David Frey, Steve Wightman, Mark Hodnick and many others.

Henry was a Director with the National Sports Turf Council during the 1980's that was organized by the late Dr. Fred Grau. Many groups were represented including STMA (Dr. Kurtz), the National Football League Players Association (John Macik), Professional Grounds Management Society (Alan Shulder), University of Maryland (Tom Chambers), USDA (Jack Murray), Penn State University (Dr. Jack



Henry was very active with a number of professional groups. He assisted in organizing the New Jersey Turfgrass Association in 1970, the New Jersey Turfgrass EXPO in 1974 (served as chairman for 17 years), Executive Director Golf Superintendent Association of New Jersey (13 years), Executive Director American Sod Producers Association (5 years), Secretary, Sod Association of New Jersey (37 years) and the STMA Board of Directors, Secretary, Vice President, Commercial, Conference Chair, Certification Committee Chair and Awards Committee Chair.

As many of you know Rutgers University leads the nation as the center for the breeding of cool season grasses. Dr. Reed Funk was a graduate student at Rutgers in Henry's earlier days and it was Henry who convinced him to forego corn research and devote his time to turfgrass breeding. This stroke of genius has resulted in many of the latest and most advanced cultivars of Kentucky bluegrass, perennial ryegrass, tall fescue and bentgrass for the sports turf industry.



The Recent Years

Many of you have seen Henry at the STMA Annual Conference speaking at sessions or helping the STMA staff with conference details behind the scenes. Henry's wife, Mary, has also been at the annual conference helping with registration and other volunteer duties. The Indvk's celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary September 6, 2003. Congratulations to a wonderful couple who have been an integral part of the STMA family. STMA is very proud of Dr. Henry Indyk and have awarded him the prestigious Harry Gill Memorial Award for his unselfish contributions to sports turf. In 1999 SportsTurf Magazine recognized Henry as the sports turf "Man of the Year". In 2000, STMA awarded him with an honorary lifetime membership. It has been due to Henry's personal integrity and his willingness to serve STMA for the benefit of others that have made this man a legend in his time.

He claims he is slowing down now that he is 82 years young, but no one would know that because he continues to stay involved with our industry. Thanks Henry for all you have done for STMA, the Turfgrass Industry and society. *Editors Notes:*

Dr. Henry Indyk started the Dr. Fred Grau Scholarship with funds left from the National Sports Turf Council when it was disbanded after the death of Fred Grau. This scholarship fund is running out of money since it is not endowed. Both Henry and I would like to see this scholarship continued and would like to encourage all STMA professional members and commercial members to contribute to this worthwhile fund to help young, future STMA Leaders with their school expenses.

New Member Benefit

Your Board has approved an agreement with the University of Georgia Center for Continuing Education (Georgia Center), the Professional Lawn Care Association of America (PLCAA) and STMA to make the Principles of Turfgrass Management course available to STMA members at a reduced rate. This distancebased course is authorized in at least one state to satisfy the requirements for issuance of a pesticide applicators license. Graduates are awarded a certificate and 12 University of Georgia CEUs. The course will also qualify for fl of an education point towards certification in the CSFM program or 1.5 CEUs (the maximum amount achievable in any one year) towards re-certification of a CSFM. Because STMA is a Supporting Organization of this course, along with PLCAA and GCSAA, STMA members will be able to sign up for the course at a special member rate of \$249 instead of the nonmember rate of \$309. 





Your Board Meeting Report


The STMA Board of Directors met at the Marriott Suites O'Hare in Chicago, Illinois, on October 26th and 27th, 2003. The Board approved the minutes of the July 18th and 19th, 2003, Board Meeting. The Board reviewed and approved the Preliminary Financial Reports for the period ending September 30, 2003. The Board also reviewed and accepted the Committee Reports as submitted. Among the major issues addressed by the Board was the review of the recommendations of the Bylaws Review Committee, chaired by Ken Mrock. These recommendations included revisions to the STMA Bylaws and to the STMA Code of Ethics, and presentation of an additional document, the STMA Professional Conduct Guidelines. The Board approved these materials as presented, directing that the Bylaws revisions be submitted to the STMA membership for their vote, and the other two documents submitted for review and comments.

Much of the Board Meeting was focused on review of the progress STMA Committees had made in 2003 and of their plans for achieving their goals for 2004 and analyzing the impact on these goals of funding as proposed by the Finance and Audit Committee in the preliminary 2004 budget. Budget line items were reviewed and discussed, with revisions made during the finalization of the 2004 budget as approved by the Board. Proposals from the University of Georgia and from Michigan State University on the Turfgrass Information File were reviewed and accepted.


Other major issues addressed by the Board included: Marketing Committee proposals for continuing image enhancement, 2004 Conference details, review of the progress in development and implementation of the new Membership Management System, details for development of an electronic newsletter in 2004, discussion items raised by the Chapter Relations Committee, review of ongoing initiatives in interaction and potential alliances with targeted green-industry associations, website enhancement, and membership service issues.
