EDITORIAL

The magazine Northern Turf Management states "grass is sprouting up on 30 major college and professional athletic fields that once were covered by a synthetic playing surface". This is good news for turf managers and athletes alike. It shows a growing confidence in our abilities to grow top quality, wear tolerant turf that will reduce injuries to players of all ages. According to Bruce Shank of Golf & SportsTURF Magazine even the insurance companies are asking about standards for hardness on athletic fields. Time and again this hardness of the field has been a problem as shown by studies including those at Penn State.

Foxboro Stadium installed a sand based system this year (home of the New England Patriots). University of Michigan also put in a sand-based field. Commonwealth Stadium in Edmonton is the only professional natural grass field in the CFL and it is not sand. Is sand the answer? Many park systems are building them. They offer a mud-free alternative at a time of the year when much of our rain can be expected. Write and tell us about yours and why aren't we promoting them more. Remember, it's the athletes that benefit!
