Sequoyah was the first golf course in the East Bay to have a fully automatic water system, installed in 1961, and still in use.

CALIFORNIA GOLF COURSE SUPERINTENDENTS ASSOCIATION MEETING

CGCSA's annual meeting was held May 16 and 17 at the San Luis Bay Inn, Avila Beach. About 50 superintendents from the entire state attended, most with wives or friends as well. Al Glaze and Mike McCraw, of the Central Cal Assoc., provided an excellent program and, as usual, the staff at the Inn took good care of all of us. Those are some very nice people up there.

It probably hasn't been made very clear in the past, but CGCSA is an actual statewide association of the golf course superintendents in California, and all our A & B members of GCSASC are also members of CGCSA. You don't pay any dues and don't elect board members because the board is made up of members appointed to serve from each regional association. Our representatives to CGCSA's board are Mike Heacock and Reed Yenny, with Bill Gallegos as our alternate. Each regional association has two members on the state board.

CGCSA is a descendant of the old Federation of Calif. Supt. Associations, which foundered some years ago on the rocks of personality conflict. We're trying very hard to avoid that sort of mistake this time, and so far so good.

There are any number of reasons why a statewide association makes sense, not the least of which is to better represent the golf course maintenance and construction industry in our many dealings with California regulatory agencies. Another prominent goal of the Association is to give California some more leverage with the Golf Course Superintendents Association of America: the California chapter would be one of the vary largest voting blocks to participate in GCSAA's annual elections: Having that voting strength encourages the officers and candidates of GCSAA to consider our point of view in matters affecting us, which they have always been at liberty to disregard in the past. This doesn't necessarily mean we are about to "reform" GCSAA, or seize control, or anything else - simply that we can now attract some official interest in our point of view.

In the last two national elections the state voted as a block. All the votes from the five California regional chapters were cast by one delegate, who was selected by means of a caucus of the voting delegates and alternates from each chapter. In the next election, we anticipate that the California Association will carry all our votes as a voting chapter of GCSAA, which it currently is not. We need a current, formal set of bylaws and formal affiliation with GCSAA in order to make the California Association a voting chapter. As a first step in accomplishing that goal, CGCSA's board agreed at Avila Beach to formally organize with officers, create such bylaws as may be necessary, and apply for affiliation with GCSAA. Approval of this move is still required from each of the regional association boards - if you oppose the idea, let your board members of GCSASC know about it.

The officers elected at Avila Beach were:

President: Vice President: Secretary: Treasurer: Mike Heacock, GCSASC Bob Ford, GCSA of Northern California Mike McCraw, Central California GCSA Bill Baker, San Diego GCSA The president appointed a bylaws committee consisting of four members, who will report to the full board of CGCSA at its next meeting August 1, 1982. Application for affiliation as a voting chapter in GCSAA will be made early in the fall if approvals from the regional chapters are secured as expected. If not, the general meetings of the state association will continue to be held, as they have been very successful, and we'll continue to vote in GCSAA elections as an informal block unless that practice is successfully challenged by some other state or regional association.

Aside from the "politics", there was an outstanding educational meeting for the members in attendance at Avila Beach. Both sides of the Peripheral Canal question were reqpresented by speakers; Jerry Peppin of International Seed Co. gave a complete presentation on grass seed growing and processing in Oregon; and a Cal Poly SLO soils professor gave an interesting talk on soil and water problems that applied to many of us. Capping the day was the incredible "Santa Maria Style Bar-B-Que" on the patio overlooking the bay. If you've never had Santa Maria Style Bar-B-Que, be sure not to die until you do . . . you've missed a real treat. The secret is real oak smoke, which smoe of our members in the San Fernando Valley might be able to duplicate.

Next year's meeting will be a Singing Hills Country Club in El Cajon, rather than at San Luis Bay Inn. After three years at the Inn, Al Glaze felt someone else was entitled to the fun of putting this meeting on, and Dave Fleming graciously accepted the honors. Put it on your calendar for the end of May, 1983. It's your association.

The golf handicap system is a means by which all indivduals participate in a golf game, on a given course, on a given day, can compete on a reasonably equal basis. The opportunity to establish a handicap is available to all members of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of Northern California.

As member of an association and profession dedicated to the game of golf, we must also commit ourselves to the integrity of that game. We must know and adhere to the rules and support the decisions of the ruling bodies.

In addition to the Rules of Golf and other local rules as may be posted, the following rules and general stipulations will be in effect at all golf events of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of Northern California.

- a. All participant golfers will pay a prescribed entry fee.
- b. Only handicaps computed and recorded by local associations of the United States Golf Association; foreign golf associations recognized as ruling bodies in their country; and chapters of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of America will be recognized.
- c. Rule 37-4, The Rules of Golf will apply for all golfing activities. Current handicaps are subject to verification by the Committee at any time, to include at the time of awarding prizes. Inability to provide verification of current handicap is cause for disqualification.
- d. Being an association concerned with the best interest in golf, a maximum handicap of 20 is established. Participants with higher handicaps may enter but only 20 strokes against competition will be honored.
- e. A flight using the Calloway System of handicapping may be formed and computed at the discretion of the committee if sufficient entries warrant.
- f. Golf Course Superintendents, or persons otherwise eligible for membership in the GCSA of Northern California, are welcome as guests at monthly meetings. However, such persons are not eligible to participate in the annual Superintendent-Professional Tournament. All participants will be card carrying superintendent or professional.
