The STMA was at a critical point when Kim was hired. We were nearly broke as an association and the conference/trade show was in need of a boost of energy and new direction. Kim was essential in providing the leadership needed to help position the association into the financial security we enjoy today. She aided in the growth of our organization and recently navigated us through the SFMA rebranding process.

Kim has been an excellent resource for numerous Boards, Chapters and Members of the association. With her resignation, we found it is only fitting we honor in a couple of ways and invite you to join us in celebrating Kim:

- 2. Donation Requested: To honor Kim's leadership and many contributions to our association, a tree will be planted in her honor within the local park system where she resides. To that point, we would like to provide an update on the hiring process for our new CEO, as well as share details on the gap coverage plan that will carry us from Kim's final day with SFMA to the start of the new CEO's tenure.

The SFMA Board of Directors engaged with Kittleman & Associates, a highly respected executive recruitment firm, to help us in this critical search. The process kicked-off in May and we estimate it will take 4-6 months to complete. The team at Kittleman will help us

officially post the CEO opening in mid-June and we will let you know when it goes live. Joining the Transition Working Group alongside the Kittleman team in the recruitment and selection process are President James Bergdoll, CSFM and President-Elect Sun Roesslein, CSFM. The group is co-chaired by Past Presidents Abby McNeal, CSFM and Jimmy Simpson, CSFM.

The Board implemented a succession plan back in January to guide the association through the next few months. Actions from this plan are underway to ensure all bases are covered once Kim has officially departed. This gap coverage is not a long-term solution, but rest assured all association operations will run smoothly and effectively through the culmination of the new CEO search. Additional details of this action plan include:

- Duties of the CEO are split out amongst staff with four managers functioning as a team with equal voice in association operations, and the Executive Committee providing leadership.
- The Executive Committee has been working with Kim and staff for months to ensure a seamless transition.
- Immediate Past President Nick McKenna, CSFM and President-Elect Sun Roesslein, CSFM are joining weekly SFMA staff meetings and the entire staff and Executive Committee will meet every three weeks to stay updated, make decisions, etc.
- The Board has created a calendar of important dates through the end of the year and will take charge with setting up meetings with SAFE, M&E and others.
- Board members and committee chairs will work closely with assigned staff to keep progress moving for all committees.
- The responsibility of any public representation of the association will be overseen by President Bergdoll.

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Turfgrass irrigation using Water Reels Ru Fred Contension

Sports field and grounds managers get tired of the budget cuts year after year. Money is being spent, but not being channeled in the direction of sports fields and grounds. What is the reason? "Priorities", we are told. Meanwhile, as summer approaches and our sports fields are starting to dry-up, field use seems to increase year after year.

Water reels are an inexpensive, above ground irrigation system option that has been employed for many years. Water reels come in many sizes based on the needs of the sports field manager and water supply.

Keeping a beautiful green and safe sports field playing surface is important and is for what we all strive. This requires lots of work in many areas; this work is often wasted where there is no water source. Whether one is irrigating a 300 foot lacrosse field or an entire multi-field complex, a water reel is an option where budgets may be limited. Its portability allows the sports field manager to irrigate multiple fields with a single machine. Water reels operate unattended and shut down automatically at the end of the run. For the next irrigation event, the water reel simply needs to be towed to the next field for connection to another water source.

With many models, sizes, and lengths to choose from, the sports field manager can pick the best reel for an application which, in some cases, will allow irrigation of an entire field in one unattended pass. Other advantages of water reels include their cost relative to in-ground irrigation systems and maintenance/cost savings with respect to repairing and winterizing irrigation heads.

Water reels can be employed in the management of synthetic turf fields. Water reels are available that can be used to rinse and condition synthetic turf fields, in about 30 minutes in some cases. Field hockey coaches particularly like this operation in that it minimizes ball bounce.

Consider this irrigation option next time the budget gets cut!

Stop #1: Breeding Perennial Ryegrass For Disease and Stress Tolerance – 2020 Perennial Ryegrass Test

Speaker: Ms. Jennifer Halterman

Presentation Synopsis: Characteristics and uses of perennial ryegrass will be discussed. Breeding for disease resistance such as gray leaf spot, brown patch and stem rust and will be discussed.

Presentation Synopsis: Goosegrass is a problematic weed of coolseason turfgrass, particularly highly trafficked areas. Perennial grasses in the Paspalum genus, including bull paspalum, thin paspalum, and dallisgrass are becoming increasingly prevalent in New Jersey. This presentation will discuss ongoing research with pre and postemergence herbicides to control these weeds. Attendees will view a demonstration of herbicide efficacy and discuss various programs for control. Attendees will also learn how to identify these weeds and life cycles compare to smooth crabgrass, a common summer annual weed.

Stop #6: Soil Health for Turf Health and Resiliency

Speaker: Dr. Stephanie Murphy

Presentation synopsis: Successful establishment and sustainable vitality of a turfgrass lawn or sports field is strongly dependent on the condition of the soil. Taking the time and effort to improve or maintain soil health is worthwhile in not only pleasing property owners and field users but also in reducing need for future inputs to keep the lawn dense and healthy. Fertilizer use and water requirements can be cut substantially when soil health is attended to, and pest problems are more likely to be held in check.

Demo: Treatments to affect soil health will include compaction/ tillage/aerification, amendment with compost and biochar and fertilizer. Growth/health response of turfgrass will be observed to demonstrate soil condition effects on turf performance.

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

Don't be shocked there's a cost factor involved As this field of plastic starts to evolve.

So a grounds keeper goes out with some glue and some bricks. To fix that seam with his bag of tricks.

More crumb rubber, a machine with a brush Make's that plastic stand up with lush.

It's not the same...we all know As our favorite pet that does grow.


It's now two weeks into a cycle of fert When that plant takes it in and it shows it's pert.

An Irrigation Story



In March 2014 I had an opportunity to attend a continuing education course at Rutgers University on irrigation. Bob Dobson is a great instructor. No matter what your level of expertise is you will always take something away with you that will help in your irrigation adventure.

As I mentioned, irrigation is always an adventure: From the moment you charge your system in the spring to the moment you blow-it-out in November. There are so many things that can go wrong. Miles of pipeline and wires. Shut off valves. Zone valves. Heads that sometimes rotate and sometimes shoot water where they should. Programs that disappear in the wee hours of the morning. A true mid-summers dream.

My first course of business is to charge the main line of the system. Once that is done, I flush-it-out and recharge it with the valve open for short time to give it a chance to flush again; shut the valve and recharge again. I then turn each zone on manually and then off to make sure they are doing what they are told. If they are responding properly then I know I do not have an electric problem or a zone valve problem.

The next step is to turn on each zone and inspect each head for rotation, adjustments, and clogged nozzles. I make a note on my clip board of what needs to be done and will revisit the issues during the season as time permits. There are plenty of sports that need to be taken care of during the spring - as you all know.

After this task is completed I am ready for the system to run on automatic. Before I go home for the day, I turn on the program and take my water reading. The program at the school in which I worked ran from 2am to 10:30am. When I went to work in the morning I know exactly what field and zone should be throwing water. I would check the water reading again to see how much water I used. If the system functioned properly overnight, the numbers will line up. As anyone with an irrigation system knows, that is not always the case.

Our zone box covers and irrigation heads were cut to remove any overgrown grass so when there is a problem you can find them easily. Extra things that are in-stock at our shop include: 90-, 180-, and 360-degree heads; schedule 40 pipe of many different diameters; elbow and swing joints. This year we will stock compression fittings and dresser couplings. It saves time having them in-stock. Of course you cannot stock everything. The scope of your problem will not be revealed until you excavate and you might have to run and get something different. The common things can be stocked.

The real tale of our irrigation system started seven years ago. I inherited a system that had just blown its casing. Once the new well was drilled another contractor was putting in a baseball backstop and hit our 4-inch main line along with all the wires headed out to our fields. Yes, they were all red wires. He reassured me that when he was done, the fix on the 4-inch line would not leak and that all the electric repairs would work. However, he could not guarantee what field or row would come on when a specifically zone was turned-on. Needless to say, he was right on all three counts.

When I checked the zones, a row would come on in Field19 while another would come on in Field 21. Not one zone was in sequential order - which is important if you only want to irrigate one field manually. So, this was like having the Abbott and Costello of irrigation systems.

I shook my head and laughed. I least I had water coming out of the ground - an improvement. With the help of another contractor we managed to get the zones in the order that I wanted by rearranging the wires in the control box - another improvement.

Under his recommendation, our school purchased and installed a Variable Speed Drive to protect our well head in case of a catastrophic rupture to our lines. If the pump runs above 3450 rpm over 5 minutes, it automatically shuts down. Great stuff. This did not happen over a short period of time but consistently over the years.

Continued investment and maintenance every year improves your system to a point where you know that the system will not catastrophically let you down. Hey - They leak. You fix. One of my favorite leaks, if you can have one, is the volcano look. Our school had one of those on the perimeter of our football field. What a bubble that was. Laughed like hell. Easy to find where that leak was. We dug it up and fixed it. It was also the sign of really good tight knit turf, good root zone. See, there are good things that come of leaks.

I hope your water comes out where it is supposed to and your mowers enjoy the turf. Until next time, Keep on turfing.

Presentation synopsis: Yellow nutsedge is a problematic perennial weed of turfgrass. This presentation will discuss integrated strategies for yellow nutsedge control. Attendees will observe research trials evaluating various herbicides and timings for yellow nutsedge control. How to integrate these herbicides with cultural practices will also be discussed.

Presentation Synopsis: Crabgrass is a problematic summer annual weed. Postemergence herbicides are often used to control crabgrass. This presentation will focus on how to optimize the efficacy of commercially available products for postemergence crabgrass control. Many products use the active ingredient quinclorac which requires a tank-mixture with the adjuvant methylated seed oil. Attendees will view research trials that compare various quinclorac-based products with and without methylated seed oil at various crabgrass growth stages.

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


