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SFMANJ Fall Field Day

Rewind 2010:

SFMANJ Bus Stops at Columbia University and Red Bulls Stadium

Sports Field Managers Association of New Jersey (SFMANJ) sponsored a unique tour of the sports fields at Baker Athletics Complex, Columbia University, New York, NY and Red Bulls Arena, home of the Major League Soccer (MLS) New York Red Bulls, in



Harrison, NJ on Wednesday, November 10, 2010. A chartered bus was arranged and departed Rutgers Hort. Farm II, North Brunswick, NJ in the morning and arrived back at the Central Jersey turf research facility that afternoon after touring the two locations in New York City and Northern New Jersey.

Baker Athletics Complex at Columbia University, overseen by

Kevin Malone, CSFM and member, SFMANJ, is very unique in that all sports field surfaces at this complex consist of synthetic turf. There are numerous synthetic turf surfaces present. Field hockey is played on surface called Astroturf 12 - a



short pile carpet reminiscent to the surfaces present at facilities such as Giants Stadium, Veterans Stadium, and Three Rivers Stadium in the 1980's.

Soccer is played on FieldTurf Duo - a sand and crumb rubber infilled monofilament synthetic surface. The fibers on this surface have a horizontal orientation to limit the kick-up of sand and rubber during play.

Attendees toured a newly installed softball field. The outfield (FieldTurf Duraspine) consisted of a sand and rubber infilled monofilament with a more rigid, upright orientation compared to the soccer field. The infield and warning track were constructed with soil and crushed rock materials that are conventionally installed at softball facilities.

The baseball field at Baker Athletics Complex is predominantly a sand and rubber infilled synthetic turf system (FieldTurf Duo). The home plate area is also synthetic turf. The only non-synthetic turf locations on the field are the pitcher's mound (dirt) and the outfield warning

track and outfield foul territory warning track (crushed rockmaterial). type The foul territory warning behind the home plate area and outside the 1st and 3rd baselines is synthetic turf.



Robert K. Kraft Field, home of the football and lacrosse teams consists of a fibrillating slit-film fiber infilled with crumb rubber and sand (FieldTurf) installed in 2005. The field is in good condition and is the oldest synthetic field at Baker Athletics Complex.

Lunch was held in the press box above Robert K. Kraft Field and provided great views of the surrounding hillsides, Harlem River, and Hudson River.

The bus trip left Northern Manhattan, crossed the George Washington Bridge back to New Jersey for a tour of Red Bulls Arena. The sports field is managed by SFMANJ member Dan Shemesh, Director of Grounds for the New York Red Bulls.

Attendees got a behind-the-scenes look at the turf equipment used to maintain the soccer surface and a SubAir system that can manipulate



air flow through the rootzone. A major challenge faced by Shemesh and his crew is the absence of direct sunlight on the Kentucky bluegrass and perennial ryegrass overseeded playing surface. Stadium design and

roof materials appear limit the quantity of sunlight hours received by the New Jersey-grown sod. Artificial lighting is being explored.

Thanks go out to Kevin Malone, CSFM and Dan Shemesh for their hospitality and willingness to host SFMANJ on a tour of their great facilities!

Winter Sports Field Tips

Clean-up. Leaves, sticks, and other debris that accumulate on the grass over the winter should be raked up when weather permits. Debris lying on the turf too long can smother the grass and create bare spots. Bare spots will probably transform into weeds later in the season.

Mowing. Winter is a good time to clean, lubricate and repair your mowing equipment. You do not want to find out that your mowers do not work properly at first use in the spring. Because of the chance for wet weather and rapid shoot growth any delay in mowing at the start of the season (spring) can turn into a "behind the eight-ball" scenario very quickly.

Fertilization. Plan for your fertilization needs by testing your soil to determine whether liming is necessary to adjust soil pH (6.0 to 6.7 recommended) as well which nutrients are needed and how much. If you applied a thorough late season (autumn) fertilization, your turf probably will not need as much fertilization in early spring (March - April). Without a fall fertilization program, the turf may require some rather aggressive fertilization to encourage recovery from play or winter damage or to enhance spring green-up. Fertilization with phosphates or potash should be based on soil test results.

Winter Seeding. Winter seeding is a risky practice; the probability of the seed washing away and being eaten by birds

is very high. Work the seed into the soil if you choose to seed during winter and realize that is likely to you will need to re-seed when warmer weather returns. Seeding when air temperature consistently exceeds 50 degrees Fahrenheit provides a better chance for success.

Drainage Assessment. Winter is good time to assess your fields for areas of poor drainage. Identifying and mapping out these areas now will give you a record of where you need to treat with your aerifier this spring. If aeration is not enough, maps of the poorly drained areas will provide documentation that you can use to show facility administrators where improvements such as slit drainage are needed.

Cover Skinned Infield Areas. Wet winter weather can lead to considerable erosion of skinned areas on baseball/softball infields. Consider covering these areas during the winter to eliminate much of the skin restoration headaches this spring. Type "baseball field covers" in any of the popular internet search engines to see examples of numerous companies that can supply covers in various sizes and shapes.

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TOURNAMENT TIME

A GROUNDSKEEPER'S ACCOUNT OF PREPARATION FOR

Hosting a tournament is a lot of work, however it is a good opportunity to showcase your facility. There will be people seeing your field for the first time, so make them remember it for the right reasons. We were informed this year that we would be one of three sites hosting the 33rd Annual Joe Hartman Diamond Classic. The tournament brings together the top 16 baseball teams in South Jersey. On May 13, 2006 Overbrook High School hosted two games, but the preparation started weeks earlier.

The call informing us about the tournament came in mid-April, so we had a good amount of time to prepare. First, we checked our baseball team's schedule for possible conflicts. Next was to check our field maintenance program. As luck would have it, a fertilizer application was scheduled the week before the tournament. Timing is everything.

With two weeks to go, we started cutting-in our pattern for the games. We cut the outfield in three directions at 2 inches every other day. The infield was cut in two directions at 11/2-inch every other day. We use a Zero Turn mower (with a striping kit) to cut our outfield and a walk-behind mower for the infield. Sharp blades are very important, so we change them at least once a week.

The week of the tournament was very challenging. We had two games of our own in addition to the final prep for the big games. The day before the tournament is very important. We tried to do as many things as possible to make game day a little easier. Bullpen mounds were repaired, extra bleachers were moved, trash cans emptied, the infield was edged, and a sound check was done on the sound system. We made final cuts on the infield and outfield because there is no time the day of the games. Our mound and

home plate areas are constructed using mound clay. Both areas were repaired and covered. The infield was scarified, graded smooth, and then lightly rolled. The automatic irrigation system was used to wet down the infield at night, setting the stage for game day.

When the day of the tournament finally arrives, it's payday for all of the hard work. The day started with a light dragging of the infield, followed by another good soaking of the skinned areas. Next, foul lines and batters boxes were painted and chalked. At the last minute we decided to stencil the name of the tournament and the team names on the grass behind home plate. This was a nice touch that the teams and fans really seemed to appreciate. Finally, we painted the bases, pitching rubber, and home plate. It was game time.

The tournament was a great success. In between games we repaired the mound and plate, smoothed the infield with stiff drags, and touched up the chalk and paint. We wanted to make sure the second game played the same as the first. The coaches, players, and fans were very complimentary about our facility. That makes all the hard work worth it.

Putting together the maintenance end of a baseball tournament takes a lot of planning and hard work from a lot of people. My crew was outstanding. Their professionalism and hard work really showed in the playing condition of the field.

Tournament time is an opportunity to show off your field, while giving the teams a fair, competitive surface to play on. If you get the chance, step up to the plate and be remembered for the right reasons.

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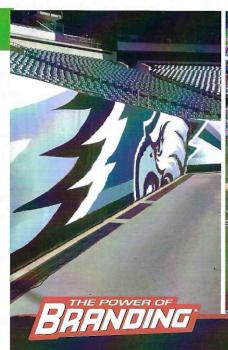
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Food for thought from a Certified Sports Field Manager

As you read these words, you're not going to find anything that you have not read before. Just about everything we know about turfgrass has already been written. Hopefully, after you finish, you'll realize that all the words written are a matter of interpretation. Not interpretation as to right or wrong, but as to how you can apply it to your personal situation.

Even though years of study and research have gone into compiling the information that we have right now, there are many successful field managers who cannot relate to a solution as presented, and instead, take bits and pieces and put it all together, in their own particular application, and form a very efficient operation. The important thing that educators are trying to get across is that with a good mix of education and practical experience you can be quite successful.

Success is not measured by methods; success is measured by results. Have you ever had a problem, or attempted a project, and you knew that what you read, or were told by someone wouldn't get you the results you wanted? Well, don't get discouraged and don't be too quick to criticize the suggestion. Your circumstances may be totally different from the case you read about or were told about. The thing you have to remember is: Did any part of the suggestion work? If it did, how can you build from it and expand it? Maybe all it would take is a little imagination and some thought on your part to solve your problem.

How many times have you sat-in on a class or a lecture and thought to yourself, "Yeah, this guy works in a lab or in some research field or in an office, how does he/she know the problems I'm faced with?" Well, they may not know your situation exactly, but you can bet they know that with the information that they are trying to relay to you, you can put together a workable plan.

Never be afraid to ask a question if you cannot relate to a topic that is being presented. That instructor would feel more satisfied in spending the entire time making sure you understand, than making his or her entire presentation and not be understood. The next time you're sitting in on a lecture stay focused on how you can apply that bit of information to your situation.

Never give-up on trying to learn all you can about a topic. Participate in Chapter workshops and field days; read publications and newsletters. Remember, the more information you can gather will give you a much better chance of solving your particular problems.

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TURF AND A BLANKET

Turf in a Blanket sounds like a meal, "Pigs in a Blanket". "Grubs in a Blanket".

When I first started in this business I knew absolutely nothing. I watched as fields we tried to take care of get utterly destroyed. What do I do now? I thought to myself, "Look at this mess".

So I attended classes at Rutgers and read how other turf managers managed their fields. In addition, I also attended Field Day events, while there I picked-up some great tips from vendors, contractors and turf managers. I was instructed how to aerate and fertilize.

So what about all those worn spots your fields have? I learned to overseed and when the best time to do so.

What about late season sports? For example, football that sometimes extends into early December and can really destroy a field. Growing grass in the northeast in the extreme winter months without help was truly impossible. I tried for two years without any success. Although, the birds that were still around relished in it. In the spring the grass that was there grew but the bare spots were overtaken by clover and weeds; another sub-par year for our football field.

Five years ago I attended the Green Expo in Atlantic City and found my magic cure, "Growth Blankets". I asked the Rep many questions and got the answers to which I was looking. I felt awesome on the drive back home - but that was the easy part. I was convinced that it would work but I now had to sell it to "The Powers to be," to invest the money. This took another year!

Finally after another sub-par football field season and many field visits by the "Powers to be", they finally were willing to give it a shot. Not the whole field mind you, just between the hash marks (considerably less costly this way). Since it was an experiment, they were not going to invest a lot of money. But no pun intended, "the seed was planted,".... I got my turf blanket. I was excited!

We core aerated that football field, tore-it-up some more, laid the seed down, covered it with the blanket and secured it with the sod staples that came with the blanket. We were all very proud of ourselves that we were going to grow grass in the winter. However, the following week I was on the phone with the factory to order the heavy duty stakes, since, we had to gently pull one of the blankets out of the bleachers and one out of the woods. Hey, it was our first year with them, still experimenting....what did we know? Also, we didn't know that we would have to deal with snowmobiles which damaged a section of one of the blankets. So FYI, for your first purchase order the heavy duty stakes, another learning experience.

So, through the winter we would take a peek under the blankets and it was amazing, it felt like we were beating nature, it just grew and grew. During this time, we did take the blanket off once to mow it put the blanket back on and it grew even more. We left the blanket on until late March at which time we brought the facilities director and business administrator to view the results, it sold itself, solid turf.

After that it was easy. Now we have two full football fields covered, a third field covered between the hash marks, and on a fourth field we have certain areas targeted. Yes, we have four football fields all being utilized. Also, we purchased smaller blankets for our goal mouths for soccer, lacrosse and field hockey. It's great, it takes the pressure off seeding during that small window of opportunity that you have to seed. Also, depending upon the seeder you have, it sometimes disrupts the playing surface and it can look a little messy with Coaches, kids, parents, and even geese complaining.

Ultimately, you can see that I am a huge fan of Turf Growth Blankets, they really work and it takes a lot of pressure off your grounds crew. Let's face it, we are all very busy between August and October. These blankets buy you an awful lot of time and a jump start on a healthy and safe athletic field. We are now into our fourth year of purchases, implementation and successes. Again, it all started with a trip to Green Expo. Till next time.....Keep Your Turf Warm.
