Biographical/Historical

James W. Faulkner was born in Royal Oak, Michigan in 1926. He graduated from Grosse Pointe High School in 1944, and enlisted in the Army Air Force.

He graduated in 1949 from Michigan State College (now Michigan State University) where he met his wife Barbara. Faulkner worked in the advertising field in Detroit for 15 years. After moving to Lansing, he became a high school teacher at Everett High School from 1966 to 1988. After retirement, Faulkner taught as an adjunct professor in journalism at Michigan State. He passed away in 2016.
